Happenings

St. James



St. James residents had the opportunity on June 4 to tour their community's vast network of ponds as part of the Tour of Ponds sponsored by the St. James POA Ponds Committee. Residents opened their backyards to neighbors, showing off the beauty and need to protect these vital habitats.

Second annual Tour of Ponds

St. James hosted its second annual Tour of Ponds on June 4, highlighting one of the community's natural treasures. This year's Tour of Ponds provided members of the St. James POA Ponds Committee the chance to increase awareness about erosion and the role the natural habitat plays in providing clean water.

St. James is home to 250 ponds including more than a dozen designated specifically for fishing.

"There are a lot of levels of information," said Merry Klinefelter, a member of the POA Ponds Committee. "Ponds vary from small, tiny little runoff ponds, to one that is almost seven acres."

A half dozen stops made up the tour, with experts on hand at each one to answer questions and provide useful information to interested visitors. Bob Murphy hosted a fishing demonstration at Woodlands Pond, offering people the chance to drop a line in the water while listening to some sound advice, and he showcased his fish-catching ability with the help of some pieces of hot dog.

"We have a number of species of fish in there," Murphy said of Woodlands Pond. "We also have turtles. The turtles are pretty smart too. Our goal is to make people aware of the natural erosion around ponds. There are a lot of beautiful ponds in St. James that we keep stocked with fish."

Regatta Pond, near Seaside Pool, shows

how a neighborhood came together to control erosion and stormwater while also planting native plants to stabilize the shoreline. The pond on Bluffton Court, known as a juvenile pond, demonstrated what a few years of planting looks like, using both native plants and trees to help control erosion from stormwater.

"We try to build a habitat, as well as protect the water quality of the pond," stated Steve Brocker, chairman of the ponds committee. "Buffers act as not only erosion control, but also nutrients get absorbed by the plants instead of getting into the pond and creating algae and other sorts of problems. We promote efforts to preserve the ponds."

Scott Blevins with Carolina Ponds and Storm Water was on hand at Blair Pond, a showcase pond planted and maintained by the POA Ponds Committee, to discuss planting and erosion control measures he used at the site. Also, various garden experts manned the Woodlands Nature Trail offering visitors information on gardening.

"There is a lot of good expert advice out here," said Klinefelter. "We're trying to educate people on stewardship of the ponds and their homes and teach them about fishing, about saving plants, to teach them that the first year you plant, everything won't come up and look like a mature pond."

The St. James POA Ponds Committee recently received a stewardship award from the Lower Cape Fear Conservation Committee for its work towards improving the community's water quality and environment.
